Geriatrics Counseling

Richard Fallin, MDiv, MBA, LPC

The field of geriatrics counseling has room for growth. With the expanding population in this age bracket, the need for competent counselors is continually growing. In this session, we will discuss the why of geriatric counseling. We will also discuss ethical considerations when dealing with the geriatric population. Informed consent can be difficult with clients in this age range, so we discuss issues related to obtaining informed consent. The competency of older individuals can be called into question. As geriatric counselors, we need to be aware of the limitations of our clients and how information needs to be presented to ensure clients understand the process.

Richard has been an LPC for 5 years and has been in the field of Mental Health for 13 years. He has worked with every population within the mental health system. His career began in the children's department. While working in the children's department at Mental Healthcare of Cullman, he learned the importance of family involvement. Eight years ago, he made the transition to the geriatrics department. Beginning as a direct service staff member, he became aware of the unique requirements necessary for therapy with the aging population.

Rolling with Adolescent Resistance

Adolescents, who are notorious for being difficult to engage, often utilize the same strategies with therapists as they do with parents to avoid engagement and accountability. Therapists, who are aware of the neurological and other developmental foundations of these behaviors, can circumvent these roadblocks to building

the therapeutic alliance. Therapy becomes more productive when therapists no longer see resistance as an obstacle to therapy but rather an asset to be utilized.

Malia is a 1996 graduate of the University of Alabama's counselor education program. She has been in the mental health field for over 20 years and has experience working with several different populations over the course of her career. In 2009 Malia joined Eagle Counseling in Huntsville/Decatur, Alabama, where she works as a senior therapist. She sees clients dealing with a wide range of issues: interpersonal, personal growth, addiction, and coping with mood disorders.

Today's College Students: Trends and Realities

As you've heard or read current headlines on the topic, you know that today's generation of college students is different than any experienced on campuses previously. In this session we will explore these differences and the resulting challenges for these students and for those offering counseling to this population.

Lynne Martin has worked counseling college students at the University of North Alabama since 2001, and is currently serving as Director of Student Counseling Services at UNA. In addition to clinical and administrative duties, Lynne serves as a mental health consultant for UNA's CARE Team (behavioral intervention team) and the Disability Support Services Advisory Committee at UNA. Prior to joining UNA as a full-time Counselor in 2007, Lynne worked as a Substance Abuse Counselor in the Intensive Outpatient Program, served as Coordinator of SAS, and then in general adult outpatient treatment at Riverbend Center for Mental Health in Florence from 1994-2007. Lynne is a Licensed Professional Counselor and LPC-Supervising Counselor in Alabama, and holds Alcohol and Drug Counselor Certification through AADAA and ICRC.

What is Vocational Rehabilitation Counseling?

This session will provide an overview of the field of Vocational Rehabilitation Counseling; history and evolution of the profession, current legislation governing the profession, Commission on Rehabilitation Counseling Certification (CRCC) Code of Ethics, disability awareness issues, current requirements to become a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor, and the duties of a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor.

Tamara M. Robinson is currently a Vocational Rehabilitation Field Supervisor with the Alabama Department of Rehabilitation Services and the parent of a child with a disability. She holds the credential of a Certified Rehabilitation Counselor and provided Vocational Rehabilitation Counseling Transition Services for high school students in several high schools for 10 years before obtaining her current position in 2011. She is a graduate of Auburn University's Rehabilitation Leadership and Management Program (2010) and Rehabilitation Counseling Master's Program (2001). She received a Bachelor of Science degree in Rehabilitation Services from Southern University, Baton Rouge, LA. (1998). She has held the offices of Board Member for Alabama Rehabilitation Association and President of Alabama Association of Multicultural Rehabilitation Concerns.
